# **COURSE OVERVIEW**

**Catalog Description (the "official" version):** Concepts and methods of statistics with an emphasis on data analysis. Topics include methods for collecting data, graphical and numerical descriptive statistics, correlation, simple linear regression, basic concepts of probability, confidence intervals and hypothesis tests for means and proportions, and chi-square tests. Completion with a C or better (C- not included) satisfies the GE Area B4 Mathematical Concepts requirement. Prerequisite: UNVS 16A with a grade of CR.

# **GRADING POLICY**

Your final grade will be weighted as follows:

- Homework: 25% (TakeItHomes = 5%, MyStatway participation = 10%, MySW checkpoints =10%)
- Participation: 10% (This includes in-class teamwork and participation as well as online contributions.)
- Quizzes: 15% (There will be at least 4 quizzes one for each module and possibly a review quiz)
- Midterm Exams: 30% (There will be 2 midterms so each midterm is worth 15% of your final grade.)
- Final Exam: 20% (The final exam will be cumulative.)

### **HOMEWORK**

No late homework will be accepted. If you are going to miss a class please let me know **in advance** and we can try to work out an alternative method for you to turn in the homework. There will be written homework assignments which are hand-written follow-up questions based on our in-class work. There will also be online supplemental reading as well as online homework.

### Technology:

• **Calculator:** You are also required to have a TI83 or TI84 calculator for use during class as well as for homework, quizzes, and exams. These calculators can be rented online, but the rental cost for 10 months is usually the same or more than the cost of buying a calculator.

**NOTE WELL:** Having received a score of 32-48 on the ELM, each student in this class is subject to Executive Order (EO) 665 (<u>https://sites.google.com/site/developmentalstudiesatsjsu/</u>). Passing UNVS 16A, 16B, and 16C [this means passing both semesters of Statway] satisfies the requirements for developmental mathematics AND the area B4 GE requirement in a nine month time period (students with equivalent ELM scores not taking these courses take Math 3A and 3B, completing remediation in one year, but then they must take an area B4 course in a subsequent year). Note that EO 665 requires you to complete remediation within one year, *else be disenrolled from SJSU* (usually to complete remediation at a community college). In order for a student (who receives an "NC" in this course) to complete remediation and not be disenrolled from the university for the 2014 - 15 school year, a student would have to complete remediation elsewhere (likely at a community college) before the beginning of the 2014 - 15 school year.
